A Message from the Most Reverend

J. Michael Miller, CSB



Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Recent discussions and reflections have introduced us to a new way of discerning the Lord's will for his Church, "Conversation in the Spirit," which embodies the co-responsibility of both lay faithful and clergy. This approach, encouraging attentive and prayerful listening, mirrors the synodal method used in the recent Synod of Bishops. It is a concrete expression of "walking together" and signifies a shift towards a more collaborative and welcoming Church.

As Catholics navigate a "new apostolic age," our parish families are called to adapt how we proclaim the Gospel. The traditional methods that once bore abundant fruit are no longer as effective as they once were. Instead, we must draw inspiration from the early Apostles who, despite their fears and limitations, trusted wholly in Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit. Our strength lies in this trust, enabling us to embrace even radical pastoral changes in our homes, parishes, schools, and ministries.

Before we can implement any changes, however, every parishioner must first undergo a deeper conversion of mind and heart. As St. Francis of Assisi reminded us, our greatness lies in a simple, radical return to the Gospel lived and preached by Jesus. This renewed focus on Christ-centered holiness is essential for a fruitful mission. Pope St. John Paul II's call for a "new evangelization"—fresh in ardour, methods, and expression—must guide our path forward.

Pope Francis uses the Greek word *parrhesia* to describe the courageous attitude we need, one which played so prominent a role in the Church's earliest proclamation of the Gospel. The Holy Spirit transforms ordinary people into Spirit-filled evangelizers, empowering us to fulfill our mission despite the challenges we face. This assurance emboldens us to face the dark nights of problems and suffering, trusting that the Lord will guide our parish communities through unexpected doors of opportunity.

Although I may not witness the full fruit of the transformation on which we are embarking, I am committed to lighting the fuse that will propel our parishes into a new apostolic mode of living out the Great Commission. Together, let us embrace this call with faith and courage, confident in the Lord's abiding presence and the transformative power of the Holy Spirit.

THIS YEAR'S VISITS

Blessed Sacrament Parish, Vancouver

Preserving the French-speaking tradition of the area, the parish also is the home of a relatively new movement in the Church, the Neocatechumenal Way.

Our Lady of Sorrows Parish, Vancouver

A cross-section of many cultures and languages, the parish celebrates liturgies in three languages and is a centre for the Spanish-speaking community of the Lower Mainland. After 34 years of ministry in the Archdiocese, the Teresian Carmelite Missionaries bade farewell to those they had served.

St. Clare of Assisi Parish, Coquitlam

With a friendly, deliberate, and attentive process of welcoming new parishioners, the parish sees high levels of engagement and participation in every area of parish life.

St. Paul's Parish, Richmond

The Catholic identity of the school is strongly evident, as is a well-developed inter-grade collaboration. The parish welcomed the Augustinian Sisters of Our Lady of Consolation this year.

St. Stephen's Parish, Vancouver

Parishioners are noted for their willingness to collaborate and exercise their gifts in every area of parish life.

St. Mary's Parish, Chilliwack

A growing and very engaged parish and school community which also serves nearby Indigenous communities and is living the spiritual and corporal works of mercy in Chilliwack and surrounding regions in a highly visible way.

Equipping Parishes for the Moment

During his formal pastoral visits this year, Archbishop Miller celebrated successes and encouraged collaboration between parishes, especially the meaningful sharing of ideas and resources. After hearing from people of each parish about the life and activity within their communities, the Archbishop explained how the gifts of each parish could be shared to enliven the present and future of our local Church.

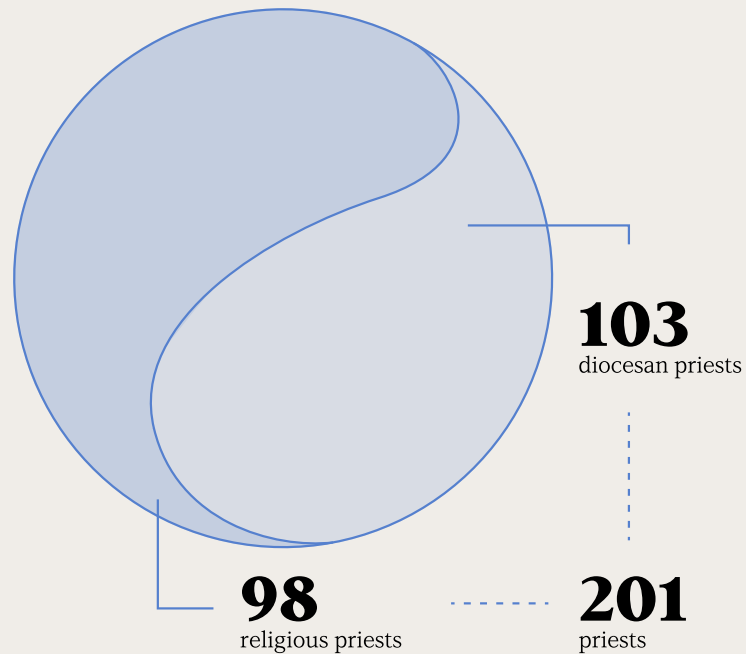

Discerning a Priestly Vocation

A TEAM APPROACH

The Vocations and Seminarians Office moved from a full-time director to a team approach with four priests serving part-time in vocations ministry, while working in their respective parish assignments as pastors or assistant pastors:

Father James Hughes (Director of Vocations and Seminarians) leads the Vocations and Seminarians Office administration.

Father Mark McGuckin (Assistant Director of Vocations and Seminarians) leads the monthly Discerners' group.

Father Juan Lucca and Father Raffaele Salvino (Vocations Team) plant the seeds of vocations through outreach to schools, colleges, young adult ministry, youth ministry, and other organizations.

INCREASING WEB PRESENCE

To bring more awareness to discerning the priesthood and consecrated life in our Archdiocese, the office is currently working on launching a new Vocations Vancouver website and increasing its presence on social media.





Promoting Vocations

VOCATIONAL OUTREACH

A key focus this year was finding new ways to reach out to young adults. Various events provided opportunities for experiencing the joy of the consecrated life. Such opportunities included visiting local university campuses, hosting book studies for young adults, hosting an overnight retreat for young adult women, and attending CCO's Rise Up conference in Ottawa.

To reach out to young women, a Mother-Daughter-Sister Tea hosted over 160 mothers and their daughters. Five religious communities were represented so that young women and girls could see the joy of religious life and learn more about it.

The Fiat women's discernment group has accompanied 5 young women who are in the process of entering religious communities in 2024.

Congregations of women and men religious continue to serve the Archdiocese in parishes, education, health care, pastoral care, and social services. They also are present at many events and retreats around the Archdiocese where they witness to their vocation.

The Archdiocese thanks the Congregation of Teresian Carmelite Missionaries for their service as they leave their mission at Our Lady of Sorrows Parish in Vancouver and to the temporary migrant workers in the Fraser Valley.

Permanent Diaconate

This year, Deacon Henk Luyten took over as the Director of the Permanent Diaconate Office and Program, succeeding Monsignor Gregory Smith, the founding Director, who continues to serve as the Vicar General.

SIX NEW DEACONS FOR THE ARCHDIOCESE OF VANCOUVER

On June 1, 2024, Archbishop Miller ordained six new deacons for the Archdiocese of Vancouver. They will serve in several parishes and Archdiocesan ministries, including ministry to men, physicians, performing artists, and the handicapped and disabled.

EXTENDING CHRIST'S SERVICE

At the parish level, permanent deacons are part of parish teams involved in Alpha, RCIA, marriage and baptismal preparation, and many other activities. They also serve various ethnic communities including Chinese, Eritrean, Filipino, Goan, Hispanic, and Sri Lankan Catholics. Deacons also inspire and support parish growth through their involvement on parish leadership teams.

Some permanent deacons, while they may assist at their home parish, are assigned to specific ministries such as prison ministry, Gardens of Gethsemani, hospital and senior home care, men's ministry, ecumenical outreach, port chaplaincy, Courage and Encourage, liturgical ministry for staff and passengers at Vancouver International Airport, service to the Permanent Diaconate Office, and others.

Synod on Synodality

The 2021-2024 Synod continues to shape the Archdiocese as an increasing number of priests, deacons, consecrated women and men, and lay faithful become engaged in the synodal process. Conversation in the Spirit workshops are taking place in many parishes and schools.

An all-day gathering of nearly 150 priests and lay leaders from more than half of our 77 parishes met on March 16, 2024. In their evaluations of the event, the participants overwhelmingly expressed their desire to continue using the synodal process and Conversation in the Spirit to discern their role in fostering the Church's mission of evangelization.

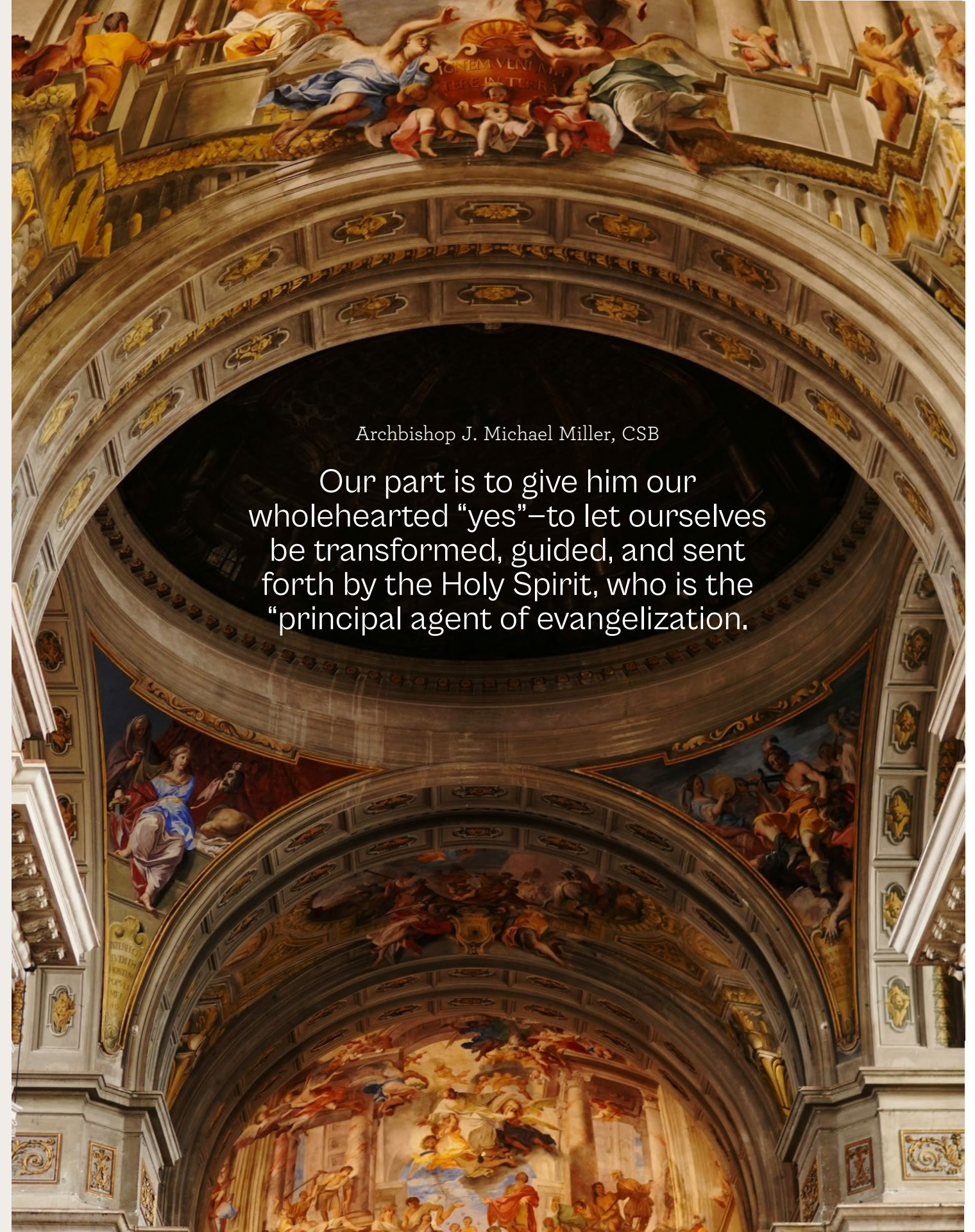
In May 2024, Father Pierre Ducharme, OFM, pastor of St. Joseph the Worker in Richmond, represented Canada in the Parish Priests for the Synod meeting in Rome. He returned to act as a missionary for synodality among his brother priests.

Archbishop Miller returned to Rome as a delegate from Canada for the second session of the Synod on Synodality in October 2024 after representing Canada's English-speaking bishops at the Synod in October 2023.

Archdiocesan staff are now providing training workshops to foster the use of Conversation in the Spirit in parishes to form leaders and those involved in various ministries in the practice of active listening. The goal is for people to become more familiar with the synodal process and Conversation in the Spirit when making decisions. In this way, they will be more prepared to implement the changes necessary to put in place the "missionary option" called for by Pope Francis in *Evangelii Gaudium*.

MARRIAGE FORMATION

520+ couples participated in marriage formation

100 mentor couples involved in Witness to Love mentorship program accompanying couples preparing for marriage in the Church

94 couples participated in Alpha Marriage Courses hosted at six parishes

27 couples are trained as facilitators active in marriage formation

MARRIAGE ENRICHMENT

145 couples benefitted from marriage enrichment opportunities including Date Nights, Weekend Getaway, and Together for Good workshops

32 couples participated in Together for Good, a one-day marriage enrichment course in partnership with Family Life Canada

19 couples participated in Weekend Getaways (Winter and Fall) in partnership with Family Life Canada

YOUTH FERTILITY AWARENESS

Youth Fertility Awareness presentations were given at six high schools. Topics included male and female anatomy, menstrual cycles, conception and how to track the ovulation cycle, factors in fertility health, and practical information on how to protect fertility and overall health.

A COMPASSIONATE APPROACH TO INFERTILITY

Two webinars were hosted in Spring 2024 featuring presentations from two medical doctors and testimonies from two couples.

SUPPORTING CATHOLIC SINGLE MOTHERS

For the first time, the Archdiocese partnered with Momentum, a faith community for Catholic single mothers, on a luncheon and a retreat for mothers and their children.

12 mothers and their children attended the Momentum luncheon (February 2024)

17 mothers and 15 children attended the Momentum Retreat (May 2024)

FAMILY CAMP

Inspired by Pope Francis at the 9th World Meeting of Families, the Archdiocese hosted its first Family Camp in August 2024. This event brought together families from all over the Archdiocese for a weekend filled with fun and opportunities for spiritual growth.

SPIRIT DAY

THEME: ANOINTED

1,730 Grade 7 students from across the Archdiocese participated in this one-day youth rally at Chandos Pattison Auditorium. It was offered twice to serve as many students as possible. The connection between Baptism and Confirmation was emphasized: our anointing in these sacraments gives us the strength to go out and be active members of the Church.

CATHOLIC YOUTH CONFERENCE

THEME: MEANT FOR MORE

The Catholic Youth Conference welcomed approximately 100 high school-aged youth. This youth rally was a full-day event with keynote talks, breakout sessions, and time for prayer and fellowship. This year's theme, "Meant for More," focused on how young people should see themselves not simply in the role that others assign them, but as persons who are called and ultimately destined to live in the fullness of God himself.

ARISE

This five-day overnight camp welcomed 31 youth in Grades 8 and 9 focused on equipping them with training and tools for evangelization.

A key focus for lay formation is supporting parish leaders. The past year provided opportunities for young adult leaders to connect and support leadership development at the parish level through different training possibilities and events.

EQUIPPING YOUNG ADULT LEADERS

Proclaim

UPPER ROOM

The 2023 Upper Room Conference focused on parish leadership, helping participants see their evangelizing mission. As a result, several parishes started leadership teams, Alpha, and other evangelizing initiatives such as accompaniment masterclasses or leadership summits.

ALPHA RETREATS

Many parishes continue to use Alpha as a way of bringing their communities together through food, fellowship, and dynamic video content to provide people with an introduction to Christianity.

This past year, Proclaim hosted three separate Alpha retreats for 270 participants. This provided an opportunity for multiple parishes to connect, learn from each other and share resources.

THE RESCUE PROJECT

The Rescue Project is an eight-week program that inspires Catholics to proclaim the Gospel in a compelling way through storytelling and personal testimony.

Father John Riccardo and the ACTS XXIX team hosted the first-ever Rescue LIVE Conference in Vancouver in May 2024, where the Gospel was presented in a new and enlivening way. In addition, a separate retreat called “Mission Equipped” was hosted by the ACTS XXIX team specifically for ministry leaders.

Chinese, Hispanic, and Filipino MINISTRIES

CHINESE MINISTRY

In this year's programming the Chinese Ministry put a focus on the Word of God. Sister Maria Ko, FMA, a renowned Chinese biblical scholar and prolific writer, shared her deep passion for the Word. Edward Liu, an award-winning local photographer, showed parishioners how to meditate on the Word through the lens. RCIA training videos in Mandarin have been used in some parishes for their Chinese-speaking catechumens. The Chinese community also celebrated culturally significant occasions: Masses were celebrated for the Year of the Dragon and to honour and remember ancestors during Ching Ming (Chinese Cultural Tomb Festival).

HISPANIC MINISTRY

The Hispanic Ministry continued to grow to support the increasing number of farm workers and Hispanic immigrants in the Lower Mainland and Fraser Valley. This includes training volunteers for Temporary Farm Workers Ministry in six parishes, minister training in Hispanic ministry at five parishes, integrating Hispanics into the synodal process at St. Ann's in Abbotsford, and running a Spanish language Alpha program at Our Lady of Sorrows, Vancouver. There was also a particular focus on preparing the second edition of the Pastoral Plan for Hispanic Ministry.

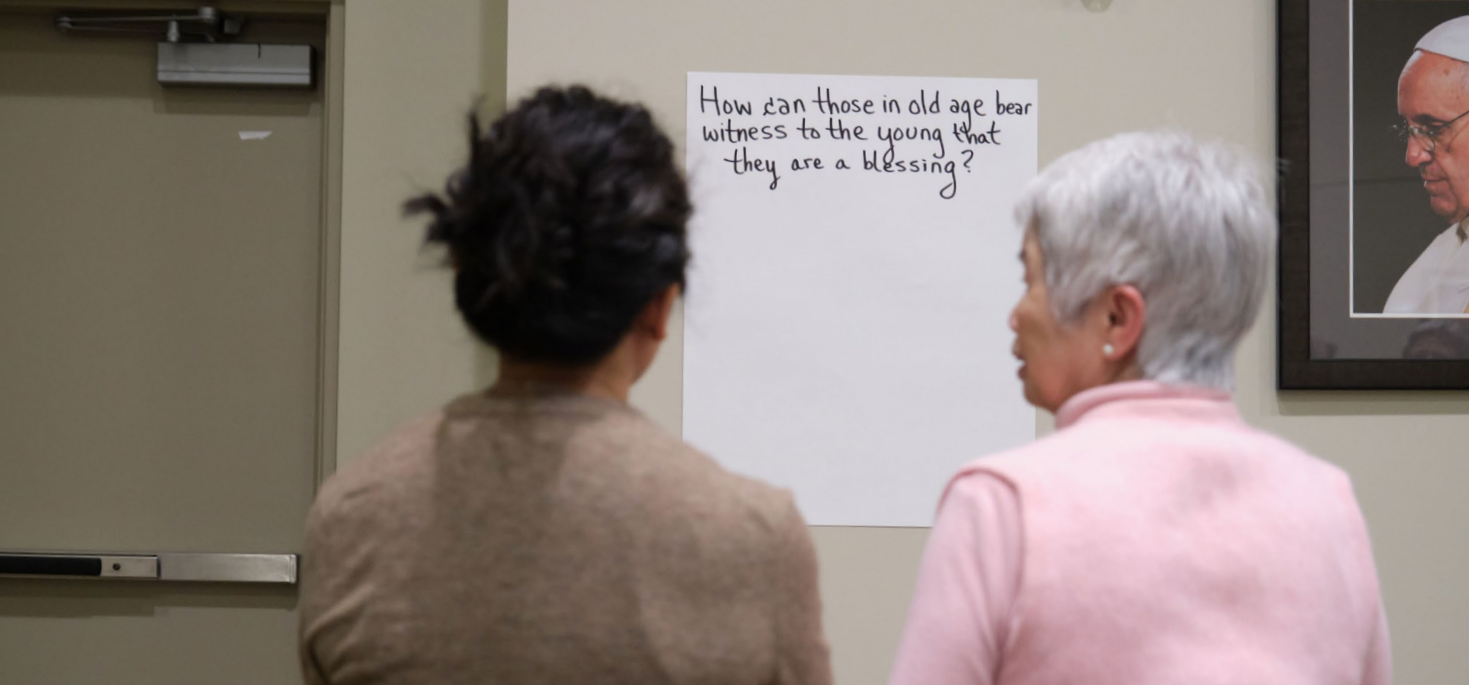
FILIPINO MINISTRY

The Filipino Ministry partnered with the Philippines Historama Society of BC to present the stage production Cenaculo (Passion of the Christ), providing an opportunity for a shared spiritual encounter during Lent. The ministry also partnered with the Cebuano Society of Canada for the Official Enshrinement of St. Pedro Calungsod, the Filipino patron saint of migrants and youth, at St. Monica's in Richmond. In addition, the community celebrated parish devotions, including the second anniversary of the opening and dedication of the Santo Niño Shrine at St. Anthony of Padua in Agassiz.

ECUMENISM AND INTERFAITH RELATIONS

Ecumenism and Interfaith Relations is overseen by a nine-person commission appointed by Archbishop Michael. This ministry supports 40 parish representatives in building relations with local Christian churches and other faith groups.

In November 2023, a retreat was organized for parish representatives to come together in prayer and seek God's guidance in fostering a culture of ecumenism and interfaith relations in local communities. The retreat provided valuable opportunities for sharing and mutual support. In 2024, eleven joint prayer services were held for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity.

Moreover, the Archdiocese has actively participated on the Canadian Council of Churches' Justice and Peace Commission. Several Catholic reflections were included in the publication of an ecumenical anti-racism devotional booklet.

The year also marked new endeavours, which included:

- ◆ Attending a Friday prayer service in September 2023 with the Archbishop at BC Muslim Association's Richmond Jamia Masjid
- ◆ Public prayer support at rallies organized by the Jewish community following the Oct. 7 Hamas attack
- ◆ Over 120 attendees at a community dinner and conversation between Rabbi Dan Moskowitz and the Archbishop with the Temple Sholom community in November 2023

Pro-Life

PRO-LIFE SUNDAY

Over \$163,000 contributed to the 2023 second collection

19 pro-life grants amounting to more \$156,000

Funding received from the second collection supported numerous pro-life events and programs, including a Reverence for Life conference for high school students, the B.C. March for Life, local crisis pregnancy centres, pregnancy care outreach to Indigenous communities, Rachel's Vineyard, and the Life Affirmation Program.

Grants also went to different media projects such as the film "Dead Wrong" on euthanasia and mental illness, and several publications on end-of-life issues and palliative care.





Children's Religious Education

The children of the Archdiocese are supported in their religious education through various programs.

5,350 total students in PREP

3 new atriums (CGS classrooms) were opened

This year, three new levels of formation created for Catechesis of the Good Shepherd reaped significant benefits for children and catechists. Through their training, catechists have influenced their pastors and principals in rethinking faith formation for children. Parishes are also incorporating elements of CGS into other ministries like PREP, RCIA, and Liturgy of the Word for Children (LWC). We have also provided new opportunities for teachers to receive this formation, such as offering a Bilingual French Immersion School for Level 1 CGS formation.

61 catechists certified across three levels of Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS)

400+ hours of combined training in CGS

A partnership with Franciscan at Home, an online formation platform, provides continual catechist formation in PREP and LWC. In-person "Beginning Catechists Training" and "Orientation to LWC" have resumed with the addition of Franciscan at Home elements to enrich course delivery.



Vanspec

Vanspec helps students with diverse needs receive sacramental preparation and ongoing faith formation regardless of age or abilities.

53 volunteers across all centres

24 students received the Sacraments in 2024

16 volunteers across all centres

44 students in 2023-2024 catechetical year

The ministry has provided support to PREP teachers who serve students with diverse needs through the use of adaptive materials. Volunteers from Catholic high schools serve as teaching assistants.

Our Lady of Lourdes Parish warmly welcomed Vanspec to celebrate the sacraments of First Holy Communion and Confirmation. The faith community supported the ministry with a choir, and volunteers organized a reception for the First Communicants and their families.

“Vanspec has taught me that Christ's image is present in every human being, while our students have taught me how to find joy in the smallest things that I take for granted. As a catechist, we serve the needs of our students, but they allow us to encounter Christ more intimately in our hearts, and that's what keeps this ministry going. Vanspec has been life-giving in my vocational journey, and I am forever grateful for our students who play a significant role in the Body of Christ.”

SERVICE IN ACTION

Students across the Archdiocese put service into action through support of different organizations and causes.

- ◆ A Mass in honour of the Holy Childhood Association brought together a community of CISVA schools to empower and encourage students to help children around the world.
- ◆ The community at St. Augustine's Elementary in Vancouver raised funds and collected food donations for the Door is Open.
- ◆ Students at Cloverdale Catholic Elementary raised \$1,090 during their Missions Week. They welcomed Audrey Burm, president of Help Burkina Faso Canada, who spoke with them about this charity and the projects it has completed, some of which were funded by the students.

EMPOWERING YOUNG LEADERS

Young Citizens of the World was started by Blessed Sacrament Elementary Grade 5 teacher Marc-André Tremblay. This initiative has grown from humble beginnings into an international program, giving students from 1,000 schools access to politicians, activists, athletes, actors, and more. Through the last four and a half years the organization has hosted 76 speakers for students in 22 countries.

ADVANCING RECONCILIATION

In May, the Grade 4 students of St. Patrick's Elementary and St. Joseph's Elementary, both in Vancouver, gathered at St. Patrick's for a Kairos Blanket Exercise, an interactive educational tool developed by the Canadian organization KAIROS to enhance awareness and understanding of the historical and contemporary experiences of Indigenous peoples in Canada.

KAMLOOPS SACRED COVENANT

On Easter Sunday, Archbishop Miller and Bishop Joseph Nguyen of Kamloops signed a Sacred Covenant with the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc (Kamloops First Nation) which formalized a new relationship among the parties.

The Covenant outlines practical commitments, including memorializing residential school students, facilitating access to historical records, and retaining scientific expertise to support the Nation's efforts in uncovering truth and promoting healing and reconciliation.

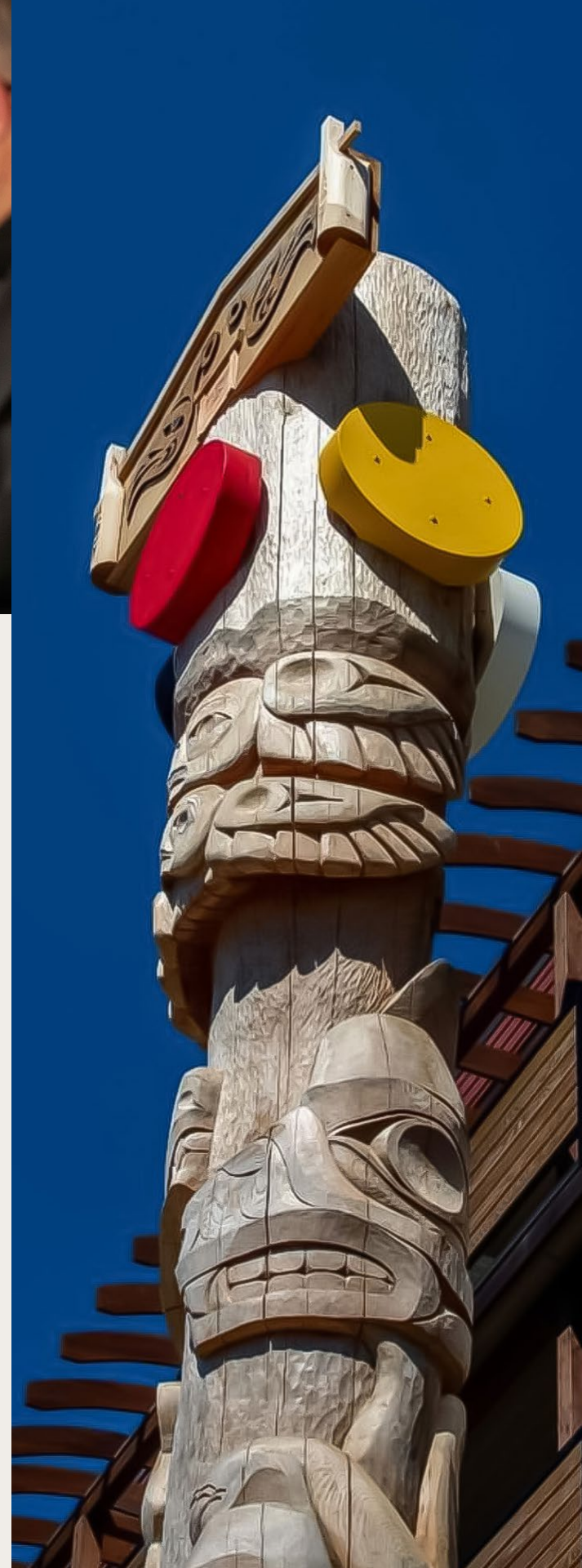


Indigenous Healing and Reconciliation



INDIGENOUS RECONCILIATION FUND

The Indigenous Reconciliation Fund supports projects related to healing, reconciliation, culture, education, and dialogue. Since the fund's inception in 2021, 21 Healing and Reconciliation grants have been distributed by the Archdiocese, totalling over \$1.1 million.

PARISH RECONCILIATION GROUPS

The goal of Parish Reconciliation Groups is to work toward reconciliation with our Indigenous brothers and sisters in a variety of ways. Through the light of faith and prayer these groups focus on education and awareness within each group and parish. To date, the goal has been to better understand our shared history and create welcoming spaces in our hearts and parishes. Six parishes in the Archdiocese currently have active Parish Reconciliation Groups, with members discerning how to deepen their Indigenous knowledge, build relationships, and act together as individuals and communities.

Bringing *Hope and Healing* to the Most Vulnerable

PRISON MINISTRY

Leadership from within the parish is vital for growing prison ministry. The invitation to “come and see” (Jn 1:39) is more tangible when individuals encounter someone they know who has experienced this ministry to the incarcerated.

St. Ann’s Parish in Abbotsford hosted a volunteer recruitment drive for prison ministry with the support of the pastor. A dozen people showed up to learn more about the ministry, and work is underway to assist new volunteers through the clearance process required by the institutions.

Three permanent deacons serve in our federal prisons. There is, however, a growing need for Catholic chaplains in our provincial and federal institutions. This year, prison ministry collaborated with the Archdiocese’s diaconate program to explore more opportunities for deacons to serve in the prisons.

The presence of Catholic clergy and volunteers at different institutions has a powerful impact.

One man, named Carl, journeyed with prison ministry while he was still in prison. He was attracted to the Catholic faith by the witness of volunteers. Upon release, Carl was welcomed into a parish by the pastoral team. With full disclosure of his past to the pastor, Carl helped the parish live out what it means to be a welcoming Eucharistic community. He inspired significant changes within the parish leadership and was received into full communion with the Church this Easter. Bridging the gap between prisons and parishes is an important element of the ministry, which equips parish teams to feel confident in welcoming recently released individuals into their fold.

VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The Volunteer Program helps Catholics to be more involved in the corporal and spiritual works of mercy in their parish.

This past year, 15 parishes were aided in recruiting and launching a volunteer program. 50% of parishioners express interest in participating when volunteer programs are launched at their parish.

Greater collaboration has developed between our Catholic schools and the Volunteer Program. 40 CISVA schools responded to the needs of the Men’s Shelter and The Door is Open.

REFUGEE PROGRAM

The Refugee Program encourages parishes to participate in refugee sponsorship, providing parishioners – many of whom are immigrants themselves – with a deeply fulfilling ministry where they can share their experiences of coming to Canada. In this way they live out their Catholic faith and demonstrate the love of Jesus to the vulnerable.

Men's Shelter

66,000+ meals served

The Men's Shelter provides meals, beds, and shower facilities for up to 90 days for each guest received into the program. The shelter also provides free care kits with soap, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, razors, and clothing for those who need them. Case management services are also available for guests to support them in getting additional outside resources to help them transition into more permanent housing.

661 men served from Sept. 1 to May 17

Collaboration with parishes provided parishioners the opportunity to exercise the corporal works of mercy by helping to feed the homeless population served by the Men's Shelter. For example, parishes on the North Shore supplied homemade meals twice a month. Volunteers from other parishes serve at the shelter and donate care kit items.

A new addition to Men's Shelter programming included a bi-weekly musical concert program, which creates a sense of community among guests.

Catholic Cemeteries

Catholic Cemeteries operates Gardens of Gethsemani and St. Peter's Cemetery. Its mission is to evangelize the living, educate and support families to prepare for the end of life, bury the dead, comfort families, and provide sacred space for prayer and worship.

IN THE PAST YEAR:

- ◆ 1,300+ families served in preparing memorial plans
- ◆ 600+ families assisted with immediate memorial needs and aftercare services
- ◆ 15+ parish Meaningful Funerals & Sacred Burials seminars hosted
- ◆ Held monthly Estate & Memorial Planning webinars
- ◆ Served the community with a monthly Mass of Remembrance
- ◆ Provided bereavement support with monthly Rosary Walks, support groups, and providing bereavement resources
- ◆ Hosted school groups who received information on the end of life from a Christian perspective and on the meaning of the Resurrection. Students also cleaned veterans' and priests' graves

ENLIGHTENED BY THE LIGHT OF THE RESURRECTION

This year, Catholic Cemeteries published a new prayerbook called the "Stations of the Resurrection," a growing devotion commemorating Christ's appearances after his Resurrection. The prayerbook was released with the opening of a new burial and devotional area at the Gardens of Gethsemani called the Way of Light. The area features the 14 Stations of the Resurrection, offering an additional space for prayer and reflection.



BEREAVEMENT MINISTRY

14 parishes now offering bereavement support

Quarterly meetings with parish bereavement ministers were held over the past year. These meetings are an opportunity to debrief, get to know each other, and provide support in this challenging ministry.

MINISTRY TO THE SICK AND SUFFERING

- ◆ **20 volunteers** trained for the eight-week Spiritual Care series, which educates parishioners on serving those who are suffering and need expressions of care and love
- ◆ **45 attendees** at parish Horizons of Hope workshops using the palliative care program produced by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops
- ◆ **101 participants** in the Being With program, a training course on visiting the sick and homebound

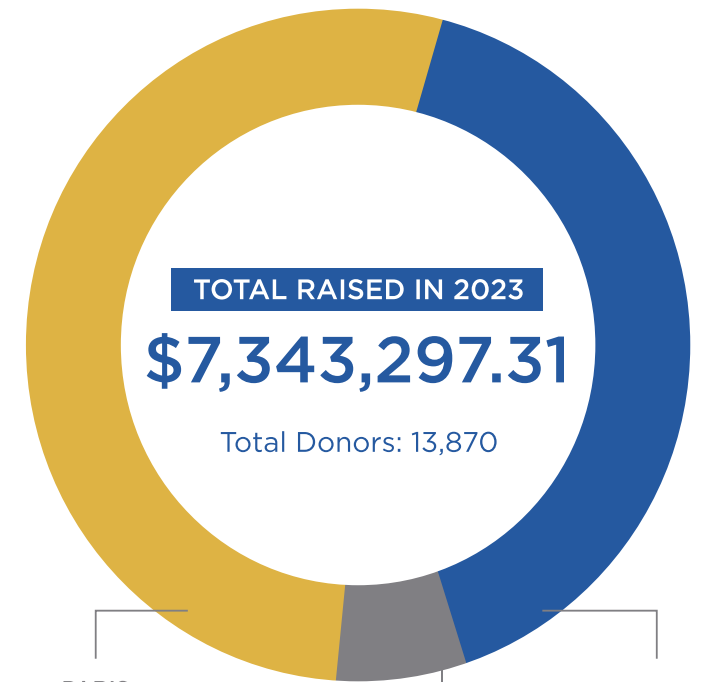

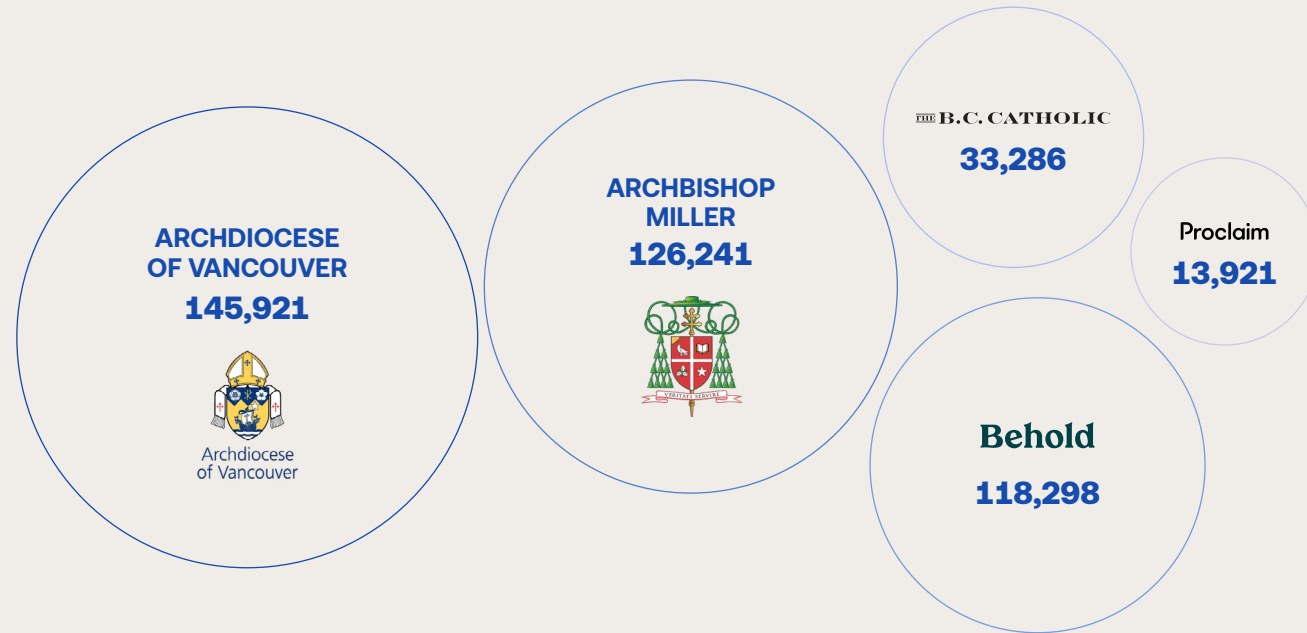
